1. Course Orientation and Requirements

(1) Course Orientation

This course is an English elective course for undergraduate students in urban and rural planning majors and beyond. It is intended for 3rd-4th year undergraduate students in urban and rural planning, architecture, and landscape architecture. The course systematically provides the basic theory and analysis methods in and derived from urban sociology. Through a series of lectures and field investigations, students are required to understand the basic principles of urban sociology, master the spatial analysis methods for urban social phenomena, and use these methods to investigate, analyse and evaluate urban-rural practices. It aims to support the fundamental knowledge for future urban planning design and management.

(2) Course Objectives

Course Objectives 1: Familiar with the basic theory and development context of urban sociology.

Course Objectives 2: Learn and master the basic analytical methods in urban sociology.

Course Objectives 3: Use these methods to investigate and evaluate urban planning practice.

2. Course Content, Teaching Requirements, Credit Hour Allocation, and Teaching Methods

This course is an elective course for undergraduates majoring in urban and rural planning (taught in English). It provides the basic theory of urban sociology and the approaches to the sociological interpretation of urban space. The course introduces the theoretical development trends and research methods of urban sociology under the background of new technologies in the form of a combination of theories and cases. It covers the content of housing and residential mobility, community and residential segregation, multiculturalism and urban integration, urban renewal and public participation, rural revitalization and urban-rural integration, etc.

This course emphasises lecturing with field studies and guides students to practice the theoretical knowledge and research methods taught in the classroom. It encourages the students to use extra-curricular hours to carry out social investigation and research focusing on urban social phenomena and problems identified in real life.

There are 18 in-class hours of lectures and seminars in the course. And it suggests extracurricular hours for field investigation.

3. The connotation of "moral education" in the curriculum

Emphasising the requirement of "complying with the new situation of urban tasks, the new requirements of reform and development, the new expectations of people, and insisting on the people-centred development". Emphasising the teaching form of combining lectures of theories and social practices through systematically teaching domestic and foreign theories of urban sociology and analytical methods and using them to interpret the spatial mechanism behind urban social phenomena. The course also guides students to participate in communities, engage in everyday practices in urban life, and pay attention to social hotspots and vulnerable social groups with the guidance of learned theories and analytical methods. In order to deepen their understanding of China's urbanisation and development of society, observation, interviews, and questionnaires among other investigation methods are encouraged. The in-depth understanding enables students to establish correct ideological thoughts and values, and strengthen the social responsibility of urban planners.

4. Assessment, grading methods, and retake requirements

This course combines process assessment and assessment of the final project. The specific assessment methods, contents and corresponding indicators are shown in the table below.
